"Taming the Tongue"

James 3:1-12

Five reasons why we need to control our tongue.

The tongue's potential to bring judgment (Matthew 12:36, James 3:1).

The tongue's potential to effect the course of our lives (James 3:2).

The word "stumble" (PTAIO), as in James 2:10, denotes a <u>moral</u> lapse. In its literal sense the term conveys the picture of the foot <u>striking</u> against some obstacle so as to cause the individual to trip or stumble; metaphorically it denotes the fact of a failure in <u>duty</u>, a mistake that is <u>blameworthy</u>, or a <u>sin</u>.

As we consider the question of what might constitute a moral lapse in respect to our speech we must appreciate the fact this would include not only sins of <u>commission</u> but also sins of <u>omission</u>.

James uses the word "perfect" (TELIOS) not to describe a morally <u>flawless</u> man but rather a man with a <u>purified</u> and <u>mature</u> heart." (James 1:4, 3:10).

In this context "body" seems to refer to the person in <u>general</u>, to his <u>whole</u> being. In other words, if we can control our tongues we can control the <u>entire course</u> of our lives.

James uses two analogies to show the power of the tongue to control.

The <u>bridle</u> (V. 3)

The <u>rudder</u> (V. 4)

We <u>cannot</u> change the way we speak until the Lord Himself <u>changes</u> us. Therefore, before we can bring our tongue under control in <u>any</u> area we must give our lives up to the Lord in <u>all</u> areas (John 15:4-5).

What has the Lord called us to do with our tongues directly which is directly tied to our devotion to Him?

We are called to come before Him in praise and thanksgiving (Psalms 95:1-4).

We are called to share our testimony with the righteous (Psalms. 22:22).

We are called to reveal the Lord to the nations (Psalms 57:9-11).

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
