"Friendship with the World"

James 4:1-6

We can know if we have become a friend of the world if our various relationships are characterized by turmoil (James 4:1).

We can know if we have become a friend of the world if we find ourselves in conflict with ourselves (James 4:1-4).

James identifies for us three causes of internal conflict.

The first cause is uncontrolled desire (James 4:1).

The second cause is unfulfilled desire (James 4:2).

The third cause is <u>selfish</u> desire (James 4:2-3).

Why would professing believers <u>not</u> ask for what they do not have?

They believe in their personal sufficiency.

The more we come to the Lord in prayer the happier He is with us (1 Thessalonians 5:17).

The Lord wants us to continually come to Him in prayer. Not only as an expression of our <u>worship</u> but also as an expression of our <u>need</u> (Hebrews 4:16).

<u>Before</u> I look to myself or others to meet my needs I must humbly turn to the Lord. I am not saying that we must not exercise personal <u>responsibility</u> when we are faced with various challenges in our lives but exercising personal <u>responsibility</u> should not <u>preempt</u> or even <u>precede</u> humbly bringing our need before the Lord in prayer and acknowledging that we need his <u>help</u> (Hosea 7:8-12).

They do not believe in the power of prayer.

God will <u>always</u> answer biblical prayer. He won't just answer it <u>some</u> of the time, but <u>all</u> of the time (Matthew 7:7-8).

It really boils down to this: Either prayer <u>works</u> or it <u>doesn't!</u> Either God is telling us the <u>truth</u> or He <u>isn't!</u> The world for the most part does <u>not</u> believe in prayer. They believe in <u>themselves</u>. This is the reason why professing Christians who have become <u>contaminated</u> by the world do <u>not</u> pray.
