"Watch What You Say"

James 4:11-12

We are commanded not to use <u>destructive</u> words.

The word translated "speak against" (KATALAEITE) literally means to "speak down on." Therefore the command to "speak against one another" forbids any speech which runs down another person."

If we are going to keep from running people down in our conversations we must be committed to building people up in our conversations (Ephesians 4:29).

If we are ever going to get this speech area right it is very important that we not only get it right with our friends and family outside of the church but more importantly we need to get it right with our <u>brothers and sisters</u> in Christ (John 13:34,35; James 4:11).

Using destructive words is prideful.

Using destructive words is a self-elevation above the law (James 4:11).

The Greek in verse 11 does not have a <u>definite</u> article before the word "law" which most likely keeps the thought purely <u>qualitative</u>. The reference therefore is not likely to the Mosaic Law but rather to the law governing the Christian life "the <u>royal law</u>," which is the law of Christian <u>love</u> (James 2:8).

Their failure to keep the royal law, the law of love, in respect to their speech amounts to <u>judging</u> it, in that he has judged it to be invalid and unnecessary.

James is not saying that Christians are never to make <u>judgments</u> about Christian brothers. What the scriptures forbid is <u>judgmentalism</u>, a critical and censorious spirit that <u>judges</u> everyone and everything, seeking to run others down rather than building them up (1 Corinthians 5:9-13).

The instruction to "not judge lest you be judged" is directed to people who are overlooking the <u>logs</u> in their own eyes while they judge others. But if they are careful and deal with their own personal sins before attempting to lovingly deal with the sins of this brother then the passage goes on to say that they will see clearly so that they can remove the <u>speck</u> in their brother's eye (Matthew 7:1-5).

There is only one lawgiver and judge because there is only one who is able to <u>save</u> and to <u>destroy</u> and that is <u>God</u>.

Sometimes when men get a little caught up in <u>themselves</u> the Lord has to remind them of their limitations (Job 40:7-14).

For us to judge one of God's creatures is to usurp a <u>right</u> that only God has. Thus <u>judgmentalism</u> is not only arrogant but <u>blasphemous</u>! This alone ought to seal our judgmental, demeaning lips for eternity.
