# "Patient Till He Comes"

James 5:7-9

#### Be Patient

"Be patient" (MAKROTHUMESATE) literally means "<u>long</u>-tempered" as contrasted with "<u>short</u>-tempered." It does not call for a <u>passive</u> resignation to one's fate but an attitude of self-restraint that enables one to refrain from hasty <u>retaliation</u> in the face of provocation.

The coming (PAROUSIA) of the Lord referred to in this passage is the event that theologians commonly call the "<u>rapture</u>." One day, at any moment, the Day of the Lord will arrive and God will begin to pour out His wrath upon the earth but before this can happen the <u>church</u> must be <u>caught up</u> out of this world and this event is called the <u>rapture</u> (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18; 1 Thessalonians 5:9; 1 Corinthians 15:51-53).

The heaviest rains in Palestine fall between <u>December</u> and <u>February</u>. Before the heavy rains are the "early" rains which come in late <u>October</u> and early <u>November</u> and are necessary for planting and seed germination. Then after the heavy rains end in February there is a brief break which if followed by lighter rains at the end of <u>April</u> and the first part of <u>May</u> which are called the "late" rains. These rains are important for the maturing of the harvest.

James, like Paul, Peter, and John looked at the personal return of Jesus Christ as <u>imminent</u> (Philippians 4:5; 1 Peter 4:7; 1 John 2:18).

### Be Positive

The word complain (STENAZETE) does not mean "murmur" but "<u>sigh</u>" or "<u>groan</u>." It therefore involves a <u>feeling</u> of criticism and faultfinding directed against others.

The judgment seat of Christ is not designed to execute the sentence of eternal damnation but rather to determine what <u>works</u> in our lives as true believers and worthy of <u>reward</u> (2 Corinthians 5:10).

Literally it reads "before the <u>doors</u>." The plural "<u>doors</u>" apparently denotes the <u>double</u> doors at the entrance to the judgment hall.
