"The Purpose of the Law"

1 Timothy 1:8-11

1. The nature of the Law (1:8)

a. The Law is good(1:8)

- The Law is from <u>God</u> (Exodus 20:1; James 1:17)
- The Law is <u>holy</u> (Romans 7:12)
- The Law is profitable (2 Timothy 3:16).
- The Law is an <u>example</u> (1 Corinthians 10:11; Romans 15:4).
- The Law is a <u>tutor</u> (Galatians 3:23-25).

b. The Law must be used <u>lawfully</u>

• The Law is good if it is used as God <u>intended</u> it (cf. Acts 15).

2. The role of the Law (1:9-10)

The Law is for the unrighteous, not the righteous:

- Christ is the <u>end</u> of the Law to everyone who believes (Romans 10:4).
- Paul specifically taught that he was not <u>under</u> the Law (1 Corinthians 9:19-23).
- Christians have been <u>released</u> from the Mosaic Law because they have <u>died</u> to the Law (Romans 7:1-6).
- Christians are not under the Mosaic Law because of the <u>New Covenant</u> (2 Corinthians 3:5-11).

The Law includes the <u>Ten</u> <u>Commandments</u>:

- First couplet: The lawless are <u>rebellious</u>; those who are without the Law act in <u>rebellion</u>.
- Second couplet: The ungodly are <u>sinners</u>; those who are ungodly act in <u>sinfulness</u>.
- Third couplet: The unholy are profane; the unholy act as if God was meaningless.

These three couplets address the sins from the <u>first part</u> of the Ten Commandments, which are directly against <u>God</u>.

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The rest of this list of sins follows the <u>second part</u> of the Ten Commandments, which are sins against <u>mankind</u>.

- Killing (lit. "<u>Smiting</u>') their fathers or mothers.
- "Murderers."
- "Immoral men" and "homosexuals."
- "Kidnappers" refers to stealing.
- "Liars" and "perjurers."
- "Whatever else is contrary to the teaching" covers every other sin.

3. The reason for the Law (1:11)

The Law is useful to bring the gospel to the unrighteous.

Even those who are without the Law have a <u>sense</u> of the Law, called their <u>conscience</u> (Romans 2:14-15).

The gospel can build upon this innate sense of guilt to point people to the Forgiver.

The gospel of Christ has been <u>entrusted</u> to us (2 Corinthians 5:18).
