Valley Bible Church Sermon Notes for January 24, 2010

God's Work Through Peter Acts 3:1-10

Acts 3:1-4:22 describes the initial <u>opposition</u> of the early church by the Jewish leaders. This opposition was <u>triggered</u> by Peter's second sermon in Acts 3:11-26, which came about because of the healing of the lame beggar in Acts 3:1-10.

1. The beggars's request (3:1-3)

Peter and John were going to pray (cf. Acts 2:42) at the ninth hour, which was at 3:00 in the afternoon.

- a. The custom of begging
 - Begging was looked down upon (Luke 16:3; cf. John 9)
 - Begging was a profession
 - Beggars provided others with the opportunity to receive <u>respect</u> from the community (Matthew 6:2-4)
- b. The crippled beggar
 - He was lame from birth
 - He was at the temple begging daily
 - He had people who <u>carried</u> him
 - He was over <u>forty</u> years old (cf. Acts 4:22)
 - He ascended to one of the <u>prime</u> begging spots
 - He had not been healed by Jesus
 - He could have been at the temple at key moments

2. Peter's response (3:4-6)

a. The gaze

That the beggar had to be commanded to look at Peter and John informs us that they were not alms-givers.

b. The gold

Peter's statement regarding his lack of silver and gold speaks as much to his <u>priority</u> as it does to his <u>prosperity</u> (cf. John 19:27).

c. The gift

The healing was from Jesus, the Messiah.

3. The beggar's raising (3:7-8)

The word "strengthened" was a <u>medical</u> term, used by a <u>physician</u> (cf. Colossians 4:14).

The healing was:

- real
- instantaneous
- complete
- public
- <u>undenia</u>ble
- unexpected
- <u>purposeful</u>

While we do not have the ability to bring supernatural <u>physical</u> healing, we do have the ability to bring supernatural <u>spiritual</u> healing (cf. Luke 5:17-26).

4. The people's response (3:9-10)

The people recognized the beggar was healed because he went <u>public</u>.

The healing amazed the people and provided them with the opportunity consider not only the healing but also the <u>Healer</u>.

May our <u>testimony</u> of our spiritual healing bring opportunities for people to learn of God's offer of forgiveness in Jesus Christ.
