Valley Bible Church Sermon Notes for March 14, 2010

God's Word Through Peter Acts 3:11-26

1. The crowd at the portico (3:11)

Solomon's portico was a covered <u>entrance</u> to the temple and provided a shaded area for the gathering.

The healed beggar served as a living illustration of why Peter should be <u>listened</u> to by the Jewish crowd.

2. The clarification of the power (3:12)

Peter <u>quickly</u> dismissed the notion that the healing of the beggar came from them.

3. The condemnation of the people (3:13-18)

Notice the <u>names</u> of Christ:

- His Servant (Isaiah 42:1; 49:6-7; 52:13; 53:11)
- Holy One (Psalm 16:10; Isaiah 31:1)
- Righteous One (Isaiah 53:11; Zechariah 9:9)
- Prince or Author of life

There are several contrasts that highlighted the guilt of the people:

- Their desire to kill Jesus vs. <u>Pilate's</u> desire to free Him (3:13)
- Their choice to release a <u>wicked</u> man vs. God's choice to send them a Holy and Righteous One (3:14)
- Their killing the "Prince of life" vs. God's raising Him from the dead (3:15)
- Their <u>lack</u> of faith vs. the faith of the beggar (3:16)
- Their ignorance vs. the <u>revelation</u> of the prophets (3:17-18)

A proper response to Christ cannot come before a proper understanding of our <u>need</u> for Christ.

4. The command to repent (3:19-25)

Repentance literally means, "to change one's mind" and is a synonym of faith.

"Wiped away" refers to our sins being eliminated, as in the <u>canceling</u> of a <u>debt</u> (cf. Colossians 2:14).

Valley Bible Church 3347 West Avenue J Lancaster, California 93536 www.valleybible.net The command to repent included an immediate <u>individual</u> offer of forgiveness and an <u>ultimate</u> national offer of the restoration of God's kingdom to Israel.

The presence of the Lord (literally, "the face of the Lord") speaks of his <u>physical</u> presence, not His <u>spiritual</u> presence (cf. Acts 13:24; Revelation 22:4).

The period of restoration is speaking of the return of Christ in the <u>Millennial Kingdom</u> (cf. Acts 1:6-7). The Old Testament prophets did not speak of the current <u>church age</u>.

In spite of Israel's rejection of Jesus Christ, they are given another <u>opportunity</u> to repent. We must likewise be <u>longsuffering</u> in seeing people come to repentance.

Moses' foretelling of Christ meant that if the Jewish people rejected Jesus Christ, they would be rejecting <u>Moses</u> himself (Deuteronomy 18:15; cf. John 1:21; 5:46-47 6:14; Acts 7:37).

The Jews, with privileged position as sons of the prophets and heirs of the covenant to Abraham, had a <u>responsibility</u>.

5. The concluding plea (3:26)

The implication of "first" is that God's message will be going to the <u>Gentiles</u> (cf. Romans 1:16).

May God give us the grace to turn from our wicked ways, by means of our relationship with Christ, which is on the basis of <u>faith</u>. Paul was <u>struck down</u>, but not destroyed (2 Corinthians 4:9).

The word "struck down" (KATABALLO) means to be struck down as with a <u>weapon</u> or to be thrown down as in a wrestling match.

The word "destroyed" (APOLLUMI) could also be translated "<u>ruined</u>," "lost" or even "killed."

May God give us the grace to understand that our <u>weakness</u> provides the opportunity for the surpassing greatness of God's power to shine forth brightly in our ongoing bold proclamation of the gospel of Christ.
