Valley Bible Church Sermon Notes for April 26, 2015

The Conflict with the Jews Acts 14:1-7

Acts 13-14 records Paul's first missionary journey; Acts 14:1-7 describes the further conflict with the Jews after Paul and Barnabas fled from Pisidian Antioch (13:51).

1. Success in ministry (14:1)

Their pattern of first going to the Jews continued (13:5, 14) and their words likely mirrored Acts 13:16-41.

2. Stirring up the minds (14:2)

As they did with <u>Jesus</u>, the unbelieving Jews sought to undermine God's work and to instigate Gentile opposition.

3. Speaking and miracles (14:3)

They stayed a long time because of the <u>need</u> of the church in the midst of the opposition it faced. The boldness with which they spoke was not a reference to the style of their speaking but rather to their <u>courage</u> in light of the circumstances.

Signs" speak of the <u>purpose</u> of the miracles, which was to bear <u>witness</u> to the word. "Wonders" speak of the <u>effect</u> upon people, which was an undeniable recognition of the miracle.

The signs and wonders were performed through the <u>hands</u> of Paul and Barnabas. This fact served to place their ministry on par with the apostles in <u>Jerusalem</u> who performed similar signs and wonders (Acts 2:43; 5:12).

These signs and wonders were mentioned later in Jerusalem (Acts 15:12) as <u>evidence</u> of God's saving work among the Gentiles.

4. Splitting the multitudes (14:4)

The division of people is an <u>expected</u> outcome of ministry. (Matthew 10:34-36; Luke 9:50, 11:23).

The word "apostle" literally means "one sent out" and is used here in the general sense of "messengers sent out by the <u>church</u>" (Acts 13:3; cf. 2 Corinthians 8:23; Philippians 2:25; 1 Thessalonians 2:6), rather than in the technical sense of the apostolic office.

5. Scheming to mistreat (14:5)

Stoning was the common Jewish response to <u>blasphemy</u>. The persecution <u>increased</u> as Paul and Barnabas moved through Asia Minor (cf.13:50; 14:19). We learn in Galatians 3:4 that these believers would also suffer for their faith. Like <u>today</u>, some places saw more persecution (Asia Minor) than others (Cyprus).

6. Sustaining ministry (14:6-7)

Like Iconium, the cities of Lystra and Derbe were further south and east along the same Roman Road that Paul took from Pisidian Antioch. The ministry moved to a different region, Lycaonia, that was less Jewish and less civilized.

The Lord guided this missionary journey through the people seeking to mistreat Paul and through the path that was established <u>fifty</u> years earlier by Augustus.

The Lord providentially guides His people. His intended outcome may not be <u>expected</u>, it may not <u>soon</u> be evident, and it may not even be <u>noticed</u>.

May we glorify God by being <u>faithful</u> to the gospel as He guides us through all sorts of events in the ups and downs of our life.
